Ha'awina Ho'olauna (Introductions)

A useful dialogue to learn is the language used when meeting someone for the first time. It is common to want to build relationships and find connections with new people that you meet. Common questions to ask are "What is your name?" and "Where are you from?" In Hawaiian, these questions would be phrased:

'O wai kou inoa? No hea mai 'oe?
