Hāʻina ka puana Tell the refrain i ka ua Kanilehua of the Kanilehua rain

This *mele* names the important districts and places on the island of Hawai'i. Each place name is followed by a noted natural attribute (rain, wind, sea, pandanus...).

**Hilo:** Hanakahi was a famous chief of Hilo. Hilo Hanakahi is also a section of Hilo towards Keaukaha. Kanilehua is a famous rain of Hilo, a rain that gives drink to lehua flowers.

**Puna:** Puna was known for its *hala* (pandanus) groves and their strong scent. In the olden days, they would stick bracts of *hala* in the thatching of their houses (*paia* – wall) to bring some of the fragrance indoors.

**Ka'ū:** Ka'ū is a very windy district. Kuehulepo is the name of a wind of Nā'ālehu, Ka'ū, a wind that scatters the dirt.

**Kona:** Kona has various phrases referring to the ocean. *Kai mā'oki'oki* refers to the streaks on the surface of the ocean that you can see when viewing the ocean from the slopes above.

**Kawaihae:** Kawaihae is in the Kohala district. This verse talks about the whispering seas of Kohala.

**Waimea:** Waimea is also in the Kohala district. Kīpu'upu'u is a chilly rain (and wind) in Waimea. It is also the name of a group of warriors from Waimea in Kamehameha Nui's time.

Kohala: Kohala is another windy district. 'Āpa'apa'a is the name of a strong wind in Kohala.

**Hāmākua:** Hāmākua district is known for its tall cliffs (*pali*).
