The **pī'āpā 'ōiwi** (Hawaiian alphabet) consists of 5 vowels and 8 consonants:

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nā woela (vowels) – a, e, i, o, u
nā koneka (consonants) – h, k, l, m, n, p, w, '
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vowel pronunciation guide:

a – **a**bove (aloha, Hawai'i) e – b**e**t ('elepaio, Pele) i – **e**asy (Hilo, Hawai'i)

o – pole (Kona, Kohala, Honolulu)

u – m**oo**n (Puna, lehua)

The **'okina** is a glottal stop, as in the word oh-oh. It's written as a backwards apostrophe (') like a single open quote or a tiny number 6. la'ana (example): Hale 'Ikena, Hale Kuamo'o, Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani, Nā Pua No'eau, Ka'ū, Kea'au

The **kahakō** is a macron. It elongates a vowel, as in the word Ka'ū. It's written as a line above a vowel (-) as in ā, ē, ī, ō, ū. la'ana: Nā Pua No'eau, A'ohōkū, Kāwili, Ka'ū

Here are some rules to follow when spelling in Hawaiian:

- 1. Every word has at least one vowel.
- 2. There are no consonant clusters.
- 3. Words cannot end with a consonant.
- 4. A kahakō only occurs over a vowel.

The **hakalama** is a Hawaiian syllabary used to teach spelling and pronunciation by syllables. It is made up of 90 **huahakalama** (syllabary symbols). There are 80 consonant-vowel clusters and 10 vowel sounds. In the name Kamehameha, there are 5 huahakalama: Ka | me | ha | me | ha.
